Meeting the needs of our communities

Over the past year, we expanded and enhanced our services to include:

- 2 additional Peer Recovery Coaches working with families in recovery as part of Parents as Teachers, allowing us to serve an additional 24 families in recovery
- A Substance Use and Prevention Specialist to provide protective factors for youth between the ages of 12-24 who are vulnerable to developing substance use disorder
- >>> Funding for an additional full-time Family Support Worker in the Pioneer Valley to provide Parent Wellness programming utilizing the Economic Mobility Pathways (EMPath) model
- An additional Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) Supervisor, allowing us to train and support 15 more CASA volunteers, increasing the number of children we can serve in the Berkshire Juvenile Court System

Early Education & Care

Jacob's Story

When Jacob entered our Early Education and Care (EEC) program as a toddler, he was excited to learn and play with his peers, but he faced many challenges.

Jacob experienced foster care for most of his young life and had difficulty managing his emotions. When overwhelmed, he would often hit, have tantrums, and hide under furniture, upsetting the other children. The EEC team recognized that Jacob would need more social-emotional support than some other toddlers because of his experiences and behaviors. At his young age, he had big emotions — anxiety, worry, anger, and grief. Although he was recently and happily reunified with his family, the transition brought about even bigger feelings that he struggled to manage.

To ensure his future success, a collaborative effort involving site directors, teachers, and his family

was made to create an individual success plan for Jacob. The goal was to support him each new day and give him a healthy start as he continues to grow.

In the classroom, Jacob was provided with visual aids to help signal transition times. He received encouragement to name his feelings and was taught coping skills such as taking deep breaths. The EEC team's involvement extended beyond the classroom as they helped his parents connect with community resources and learn new skills to address both Jacob's and the family's complex needs.

By developing and practicing these new skills at home and in the classroom, Jacob became more engaged in learning and social activities and experienced more smiles and smoother transitions. The nurturing skills provided by 18 Degrees and crucial community collaboration helped Jacob to be a happier and more resilient preschooler.

Foster Care & Adoption

Izaiah's Story

This spring, Izaiah stood proudly at the podium to give his high school senior speech, an opportunity for graduating students to share highlights, memories, and more in front of family, friends, and faculty. Izaiah used his time to share heartfelt remarks filled with love and appreciation for his family — the foster family that opened their hearts and home to him seven years ago.

That day, like many days in Izaiah's life, he was surrounded by a village of people who walked with him on his journey. His extended family in the audience included another foster mom from his younger years and members of the 18 Degrees permanency team, who consistently supported him during each transition. Filled with pride and excitement, they each listened as he offered his remarks, laughing, crying, and applauding his accomplishments.

Izaiah spent the summer working with children as a camp counselor and many hours training at the gym to reach his goal of competing in the Boxing Junior Olympics. With the support of the 18 Degrees permanency team and his foster family, Izaiah has built many healthy and encouraging long-term relationships that will stay with him through the next phases of his life. He is now studying for the ParaPro Assessment test to work as a Paraprofessional in Springfield Public Schools and is on a waiting list for his first apartment.

"Many of us walked with Izaiah as a child and then as a young adult, never imagining how deeply he would touch us," reflected Alison Mengel, 18 Degrees Vice President of Programs and a member of the team that worked closely with Izaiah. "We are all so proud of his current successes and look forward to seeing his future achievements."



Izaiah highlighted the impact that each member of his family had on his journey, recognizing them as mom, dad, and his two brothers. He spoke from the heart as he described the bond they created.

"Those four people took me in when I was young, lost, and needed love. They gave that to me without any hesitation. I couldn't be more grateful and honored to call you guys family. You helped me get where I am today."

Child & Family Well-being

Aubry's Story

Aubry was determined to reunite her family. When we met her in 2019, she was learning to cope with substance use issues and working on improving her parenting skills according to her reunification plan with the Department of Children and Families (DCF). She was referred to 18 Degrees for Family Time Visits and worked with Erika, a Family Support Worker, to stay connected with her two pre-teen children and triplet toddlers who were all in foster care.

It was an exciting start to the new year, when in January of 2021 Aubry and her children were reunified. She had made great strides, but navigating life with five children was hard. Before long, Aubry felt overwhelmed and courageously asked DCF for help. They referred Aubry back to us, this time for family support services and we were able to pair her with Erika again because of the level of trust they had already built.

Aubry's partnership with Erika helped her access the various services and resources in her community, including recovery programming and behavioral and mental health support for her family. Even with these resources, it often felt like an uphill battle as she worked diligently to balance

parenting her five children while maintaining employment, along with finding appropriate transportation and housing on a limited income.

In the spring of 2022, Aubry found herself overwhelmed and experienced a setback that put her children back in DCF's care. She felt defeated. She wanted to give up, but Erika was there to remind her that everyone's journey has starts and stops, successes and setbacks. Growth is a learning process that is not always a straight line.

Over the course of the next year Aubry made huge changes in her life, becoming a recovery coach in her community and using her lived experience to help others on their journey. She purchased a vehicle that could safely transport her family of six and continued to show up for her children at Family Time Visits and remained engaged in their care. Last summer she completed her reunification plan and her children returned home.

With her children in her care, Aubry is working hard to be self-sufficient and continues to break down barriers to opportunity for her family. She knows now that even if there are setbacks in the future, she doesn't have to go it alone. 18 Degrees is here when she needs it.

Youth & Community Development

Kalyn's Story

Kalyn came to Pittsfield Community Connection (PCC) in February of 2021, filled with hopes and aspirations, but the path to reaching her goals was full of obstacles and roadblocks. Challenges in her home and school life led her to work with PCC. After a few months, she agreed to be matched with a PCC Mentor. Each week, they found ways to connect and have fun. They attended community events, went to the movies, cooked, and enjoyed meals together.

Over the past two years, Kalyn has had many accomplishments, including gaining work experience, achieving honors-level grades, and

applying for and being accepted into college to study marine biology. With her mentor walking with her along the way through challenges and successes, Kalyn knows she has a trusted role model and a caring friend she can lean on.

Building a supportive, healthy relationship with her mentor has increased Kalyn's self-esteem and confidence. Mentoring has so profoundly impacted her journey that she wanted to apply and was accepted into the Mass Mentoring Youth Leadership Council. The Council brings together a diverse group of high school students from across the state to actively participate in the legislative process and contribute their insights to policy goals.



When reflecting on her relationship with her mentor, Kalyn said,

"I am so thankful for my mentor. She is one of the best people in my life! I am grateful for all the fun times we've had and the support she's given me."

Kids 4 Harmony

A Youth and Community Development Program

Kids 4 Harmony is a free, intensive after-school music program in Pittsfield and North Adams. Since its inception in 2012, Kids 4 Harmony has provided high-quality music instruction, abundant performance opportunities, and family support at no cost to the participants. Inspired by Venezuela's El Sistema model of music for social change, Kids 4 Harmony removes barriers to opportunities for connection and community through music. With a three-pronged focus on musical excellence, student well-being and development, and family support, Kids 4 Harmony allows children to build self-confidence, discipline, and citizenship while widening their aspirations.

10 of our students participated in competitive opportunities across the country including Youth Orchestra Los Angeles (YOLA) National Festival, Heartland Chamber Music Festival in Kansas City, MO, and the El Sistema USA Symposium in Indianapolis, IN.

In a milestone opportunity, Kids 4 Harmony was invited to perform one of the 2023 season's Tanglewood Prelude Concerts ahead of the Beethoven main event performed by Emanuel Ax, Leonidas Kavakos, and Yo-Yo Ma on August 25, 2023.


