Our Healing Homes Foster Care and Adoption Management Services encompass some of our most transformative work as families and children face challenges with courage, patience, and compassion. Staff help children and families build trust, discover healing, and find their way to new beginnings and permanency in loving homes.

A REFLECTION FROM JOE PIETRAS. HEALING HOMES CASE MANAGER

Three years ago, six-year-old Lexi was placed in one of our foster homes. Her new placement was one of many she had experienced in her young life. Her previous plan for adoption had fallen through, and this was a difficult letdown. Then, hope emerged as the adoptive mother of one of Lexi's younger siblings expressed a desire to bring her into their family. Within just a few weeks, she was placed in their care.

Recently, I received a photo of her first day of school. Now nine years old, Lexi stood beaming in her back-to-school outfit. Her smile reflected her joy as the family is moving forward with adoption.

The Healing Homes journey for our children also includes reunification with biological parents and family members. Four-year-old Paul, the youngest in his family, was recently reunified with his mother and siblings. Over the many visits that I brought him to this summer, he learned to trust those around him, rebuilding bonds with his family. What began as a tentative process blossomed into a joyful reunion with his mother in August.



18 Degrees' Adoption Management Team specializes in matching children with adoptive homes when reunification is no longer possible. On National Adoption Day, Mary and Larry Brown celebrated their adoption of Maggie after 5 years in their foster home. Maggie's younger sister and brother were also adopted that day by a family from eastern MA. The families stay in touch and visit each other throughout the vear.

DEEPENING OUR IMPACT

Connections and Community in the Family Resource Center



e are committed to providing services that help people thrive while dismantling barriers to access. The 18 Degrees Family Resource Center (FRC) is one of our doors of access to a wide range of services in a welcoming environment where community members can build meaningful relationships.

In March, a family with two children, ages two and nine, desperately needed to move out of cramped temporary living quarters. Program Manager Tammy Martin-Bartlett helped them find hope. They found themselves on a very tight budget, working hard to find new beginnings. Dad was training to become a certified 911 dispatcher and mom was in college working on her degree. A little help with housing applications and a Neighbor-to-Neighbor grant from Berkshire Taconic Community Foundation resulted in an apartment of their very own. The kids were excited about having their own bedrooms and Mom and Dad were relieved to have space where they can focus on the future of their family.





The FRC at 480 West Street is where families can find weekly groups and programs, personalized attention for their unique situation, and events that help deepen their connections to their community. Last year we provided 2,147 services to 548 community members. We promote individual and family resiliency by providing:

- Parenting and peer support
- Help with school challenges
- Programming for LGBTQ+ youth and families
- Substance use prevention activities for youth
- Mental health support
- Opportunities for new experiences and fun activities for all ages



DEEPENING OUR IMPACT

Ready to Learn and Grow with Early Education & Care

ur Early Education & Care (EEC) team is one of many that goes above and beyond to deepen our impact. In both our pre-school centers and after-school programs, children develop social, emotional, and language skills in a nurturing environment.

Senior Director Elise Weller and Assistant Director Danielle Butler participate regularly in community meetings and conversations in support of early education in Western Massachusetts. These and other advocacy efforts help make improvements in teacher's pay, childcare affordability, and other funding from the Commonwealth to meet the needs of our communities.

Danielle and Elise are proud of their team's achievements last year. When nine Haitian children whose families received support from across 18 Degrees programs and community partners found refuge in our Pre-K classroom, it was a challenging transition for everyone. Thanks to the help of multilingual staff and the entire EEC team, every child in the Pre-K classroom graduated, ready to head confidently into Kindergarten.

Each day, EEC staff work diligently to help children and families grow and thrive. Our enrollment services at 480 West Street help families navigate the complexities of childcare enrollment. Staff at the Redfield Infant and Toddler Center warmly welcome new parents, helping them feel reassured with a loving and safe environment. Classroom and Family Liaisons are team members specially trained to assist families in need of additional support or children who may need creative approaches to learning.

Nutrition is also a key component, addressing food insecurity and exposing children to a wide variety of healthy foods to help them grow. Meals made with care by our kitchen staff include fresh fruits and vegetables and are shared together to build social skills and positive eating habits. Events like the Family Thanksgiving Feast bring family members together and strengthen community bonds.

Kid's Club after-school programming focuses on creativity and experiential learning. Eight-year old Leilani fondly remembers her first trip to the New York State Museum last summer. It opened a new world of ideas for her. Experiences like these make a lasting impression.

In my own journey toward adulthood, I am proud to say that I have discovered my talents—whether it be my intelligence, kindness, or bravery. I am embracing the young woman I am becoming. Every moment of learning has shaped me into the person I am today.

The work I've accomplished over the last year with 18 Degrees' guidance is a reminder that growth is not about grand discoveries but about the small, consistent steps we take every day. It is about understanding that each of us has a unique path and each step along the way contributes to the larger tapestry of life.

Ensuring Opportunity with Kids 4 Harmony

he Kids 4 Harmony program is an investment made by 18 Degrees and generous donors and partners over the last twelve years that has withstood the test of time. This ensemble-based string music program focuses on musical excellence, student development, and family support. Kids 4 Harmony connects talent with opportunity for students in Pittsfield and North Adams.



"Kids 4 Harmony taught me the self-discipline required to play an instrument. Early on, I would just show up and play and that was good enough for me. Then, one day I messed up badly on an audition and that motivated me to push myself and practice more. When I was in second grade, I wouldn't have thought that I'd be heading to college for music performance. Kids 4 Harmony helped me find out what I wanted to do with my life."

SUPPORTING AND GROWING OUR STAFF **Developing Our Future Leaders**

e are committed to investing in our workforce of more than 150 staff who help us carry out our mission. 18 Degrees cultivates staff to be leaders and learners as they advance their careers.

- Last year, we paid 18 Early Education & Care staff while they furthered their professional development. Some became certified teachers while others earned their associate degrees.
- Staff have access to discounts and tuition remission at state universities through our partnership with the Provider's Council and Springfield College.
- Our online learning software provides over 2,000 courses for staff to stay current on evidencebased best practices and advance their skills.

When staff turnover during the pandemic left gaps to be filled, our leadership and human resources took a bold step with the creation of the first 18 Degrees Leadership Cohort. Weekly meetings September through June provide professional development opportunities with classroom training, speakers, and outside reading and course work. The initiative was a tremendous success, inspiring an annual program.

Through the Leadership Cohort, we aim to nurture our internal talent, ensuring a robust succession plan to develop tomorrow's leaders.


